EVALUATION BRIEF Winter 2014 Quarterly Report FAST TRAC Wraparound Program

In September 2009, the Clermont County Mental Health & Recovery Board was awarded a six year Cooperative Agreement from the Center for Mental Health Services (CMHS) of the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) to enhance Clermont County's System of Care, named FAST TRAC. Wraparound is a program within FAST TRAC that is used to build constructive relationships and support networks among youth with emotional/behavioral challenges, their families, teachers, and other caregivers. To be eligible, youth must be between 3-21 years old, have a mental health diagnosis, and must reside in Clermont County with their family or caregivers. Youth and families in wraparound may have access to respite care, in-home support and intensive in-home therapy, in addition to services through existing providers. Data for this report were collected February 2011 to December 2013.



Extended Family Community Life

Interpersonal strength reflects a wide range of the child's positive personality and interactive traits such as empathy, sharing and self-awareness.

Extended family refers to family members besides parents and siblings in developing relationships and communication.

Community Life indicates how well the youth is integrated into the community, is a member of organizations and has positive ties to the community.

SUCCESS FOR YOUTH THROUGH WRAPAROUND



Compared with program intake, after 12 months in Wraparound, 37.1% fewer youth went to the emergency room for a psychiatric or emotional problem in the past 30 days.



Compared with program intake, after 12 months in Wraparound, 28.5% fewer youth spent the night in the hospital for a mental health care need in the past 30 days.



Compared with program intake, after 12 months in Wraparound, 8.5% fewer youth spent the night in a correctional facility in the past 30 days.



Winter 2014 Quarterly Report **FAST TRAC Wraparound Program**

Wraparound is a family-centered, strength-based process which guides service planning for children with or at-risk of emotional and behavioral disabilities and their families. A team assists in identifying needs, interests, and strengths of families and service providers to develop a plan centered around community supports.

CAREGIVERS ARE FINDING SUPPORT AND INFORMATION TO SUCCEED

PERCENT RATED "SEVERE OR MODERATE NEED" AT INTAKE AND AFTER 12 MONTHS (n=36)*



Social Resources indicates family or social network relationships that can help with raising the youth. Higher score indicates more social isolation.

REASED NEED FOR SUPPORT WITH KNOWLEDGE

Knowledge indicates caregiver is knowledgeable about the youth's needs and strengths. Higher score indicates less knowledge, which places the youth at risk of significant negative outcomes.

From Intake to 12 Months, (n=44)*


OVERALL DECREASE IN OUTH BEHAVIORAL AND EMOTIONAL NEEDS

School functioning includes school attendance, Individualized Education Plans (IEP). special education and in-school discipline incidents.


School Behavior indicates severe behavior problems in school and/or school placement in jeopardy due to behavior.

Family Involvement looks at compliance with caregiver rules and trust and participation with family members.

School Achievement indicates the youth is failing most subjects or is more than a year behind same age peers in achievement.

Leisure Time includes interest in recreational activities, with a higher score indicating less success or no interest in social activities.


Conduct includes lying, stealing, violence toward others and animals, manipulation of others and sexual aggression.

Impulse/hyperactivity includes problems with impulsive, distractible, hyperactive behaviors and dangerous levels of impulsive behavior that places a child at risk of

Oppositional includes threats and physical harm to authority figures.

Attachment includes the ability to maintain an appropriate parent-child relationship. Anger includes verbal aggression and physical violence.

Danger to others includes homicidal ideation, physically harmful aggression and fire

Social behavior includes problematic social/community behavior.

Self harm includes reckless behavior and intentional risk taking behaviors.

Bullying means child has repeatedly utilized threats or actual violence to bully others. Sexual aggression includes sexual activity with younger or non-consenting others.
